
In its first ten years DLLT has led a remarkable effort that has guaranteed public recreational access to 350,000 acres around Grand Lake Stream. The Trust owns and manages the 33,708-acre Farm Cove Community Forest, and is working to protect another 21,700 acres around the village.

This effort is about conserving the natural resources that support an economy and a way of life. Grand Lake Stream has been a destination for sportsmen since Passamaquoddy guides led the first "sports" to its banks in the 1830s.

DLLT has updated a website to help

everyone from local residents to first-time vacationers plan their outdoor recreation.

The Visitors Guide emphasizes ways to enjoy the Farm Cove Community Forest, but also includes information on the surrounding area (see an image of links to the left).

# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: Working Through a Challenging Economy

People in Grand Lake Stream have long been resourceful and good at coping with economic hardship. As the country has struggled through a recession over the last two years, Downeast Lakes Land Trust has been steadily working for a brighter future.

We have tightened our budget but have continued our commitment to protect and improve the resources. Our purchase of the Wabassus Lake Tract two years ago has allowed us to begin investing in recreational access roads and improving fish habitats on the property. This year alone, we've installed two bottomless arch culverts and improved several miles of road by installing ditches and culverts.

These investments – over \$150,000 this year – will keep roads available for Guides, their clients, and the public to enjoy forests, lakes, and streams. We have improved habitat for brook trout and protected watersheds from erosion and sedimentation. Just as important during hard times, we have provided jobs for Washington County contractors.

Our forest management is our greatest immediate job producer. By working to improve the timber stands and wildlife habitats, we sustain jobs for foresters, logging contractors, truck drivers, and mill employees. These businesses sustain the region's economy.

All of this work provides jobs now, and confidence for the future. As the nation's economy improves, more and more people will seek what the Downeast Lakes have to offer. Friendly people and extraordinary lakes and forests make this a truly unique destination.

Thank you to the Board of Directors who rise to whatever challenge we face, the staff for their hard work and professionalism, and most of all thank you to our many supporters. Please keep in touch with us.

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## FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

### Building Confidence

Uncertainty has long dominated conversations here. Will lakeshores get subdivided? Will the forest be closed to the public? Will the mill stay open? Will there be jobs here? Challenges remain, but there has been a lot of good news lately:

#### *Investment in the Woodland Mill*

Domtar announced the sale of the Baileyville mill and related assets on October 1<sup>st</sup> to Woodland Pulp, LLC, a new subsidiary of International Grand Investment Corporation that has a strategic interest in hardwood pulp. The \$64 million investment is viewed as good news for mill employees and the economy.

#### *Connection Available*

Thanks to the town of Grand Lake Stream and Axiom Technologies, LLC of Machias, high speed internet is here. There is a free wireless hot spot at the Grand Lake Stream town office so anyone can access the internet easily, and residents can obtain service at their homes or camps. With internet access, visitors

may choose to return or consider Grand Lake Stream as a future home.

#### *Municipal Assets*

Through Lyme Timber's acquisition of the West Grand Lake Forest, Grand Lake Stream Plantation acquired 182 acres in and around the village. These lands provide opportunities for entrepreneurs and the community.

#### *Counting on the Forest*

From wildlife to people, everything here depends on our forests and lakes. Thank you for helping to conserve them for the future while helping people now. We've ensured 350,000 acres of forests will remain undeveloped, open to the public, and available to support both the timber economy and the outdoor recreation economy.

## WEST GRAND LAKE FOREST

The West Grand Lake Community Forest Project is the nation's #1 priority for the Forest Legacy Program for 2011. The grant award will be made when Congress funds the government for 2011. With the ranking as the best conservation opportunity in the country and strong support from Senators Snowe and Collins, and Representatives Michaud and Pingree, we are confident these funds will be awarded as soon as possible.

With the Forest Legacy grant, we have a matching challenge grant opportunity presented by the Elmina B. Sewall Foundation and The Pew Charitable Trusts. Private commitments totaling \$725,000 can now help us generate \$1,375,000 in grant funds.

As we seek to raise \$24 million, a leading Maine and international conservationist reminded us this summer, "there is no better place to invest" in conservation. We agree!


## BOARD MEMBER PROFILE: LEE WHITELY

# Improving Access for People and Fish

DLLT continued to invest in improvements in recreational access for people and uninterrupted stream habitat for brook trout. We installed bottomless arch culverts on two streams on the Wabassus Lake Tract this fall. The undersized culverts installed under previous ownership had been chronically clogged by beavers, causing the streams to flow over the road, washing sand and gravel into the stream bed below. The new arches restore fish habitat.

We've now completed eight fish habitat restorations at road crossings of streams, and are seeking funding to complete more. The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service is a key partner, providing funding and engineering expertise. U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service biologist Scott Craig reported this fall that water temperatures in a DLLT stream he monitored stayed cool all summer, providing the habitat brook trout need.

Visitors to the Wabassus Lake Tract will find two new trailhead signs on the

Wabassus Lake Tract, making it easier for people to find and enjoy our newest trails: the 1/4 mile long path to Dawn Marie Beach and the 1 mile hike up Wabassus Mountain. Both are found on the Wabassus Mountain Rd, which is about 4 miles west of Grand Lake Stream and runs south from the Fourth Lake Rd.

These new trails were supported with an access grant from the Land for Maine's Future Program, which also provided funding for DLLT to purchase the Wabassus Lake Tract. DLLT volunteers cleared the Dawn Marie Beach path and a crew from the Maine Conservation Corps constructed the Wabassus Mountain Trail.

DLLT also invested in drainage and erosion controls on roads that provide access between Grand Lake Stream and the Machias River Corridor with grant funding from the Washington County Unorganized Territories TIF fund. The Bureau of Parks and Lands is improving roads within the corridor that connect to Route 9.

## Cooperation by Downeast Forest Managers

Continuing an effort to benefit wildlife across the Downeast landscape, in October the Bureau of Parks and Lands hosted the second annual Downeast Forest Managers Tour on the Duck Lake Unit Maine Public Reserved Lands. The first tour in 2009 was hosted by DLLT on the Farm Cove Community Forest.

The Downeast Forest Managers gather to share and learn from one another, and to seek opportunities to enhance wildlife habitats on a landscape scale by working across ownership boundaries. The participants in this year's tour manage over a million acres of contiguous forest lands from the Penobscot River to the New Brunswick Border.

Examples of cross-boundary cooperation among the group include protection of deer wintering habitats and travel corridors and coordinated timing of harvests to maintain a continuous supply of browse for deer and moose and early successional habitat for grouse, woodcock, and other species.

On the Duck Lake Unit, BPL personnel provided valuable perspectives gained from their decades of experience managing the property. The tour included visits to old growth forest in an ecological reserve along with a variety of areas harvested between 1 and 50 years ago.

This year's tour included representatives from American Forest Management, Downeast Lakes Land Trust, Lyme Timber, Maine Bureau of Parks and Lands, Maine Forest Service, Moosehorn National Wildlife Refuge, Orion Timberlands, the Passamaquoddy Tribe, and Wagner Forest Management. Passamaquoddy Tribal Forestry plans to host the tour in 2011.

# Maine Votes to Invest in Conservation

On Nov. 2nd, 2010, Maine voters had the opportunity to invest in the lands that support Maine’s economy, our wildlife, and our quality of life. They strongly supported investment in a \$9.75 million bond for the Land for Maine’s Future program and related conservation investments. From Grand Lake Stream to Portland, communities recognized that their economy, their quality of life, and their legacy to their children depend on conservation of the forests, lakes, streams, and coasts that make Maine special.

DLLT worked to help spread the word among Maine voters. Links are available on [www.downeastlakes.org](http://www.downeastlakes.org) to a panel discussion on “State of the State” focused on the benefits of the Land for Maine’s Future Program to Maine people and the Maine economy. Mark Berry discussed how the program has helped Grand Lake Stream – from Little Falls to the Farm Cove Community Forest – and is likely to be important to the \$24 million capital campaign for the West Grand Lake Community Forest.
