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[New Method Could Help Effort to Restore Maine's Streams](#)

Poorly designed culverts are blocking the passage of brook trout and other aquatic wildlife on thousands of streams across Maine. Restoring streams is a priority for Downeast Lakes Land Trust. Our latest project, just completed with support from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, has the potential to be a model for cost-effective restoration of aquatic habitat.

“This new concrete arch structure holds great promise to provide economic savings and long-term benefits over traditional corrugated metal crossing structures,” said Scott Craig, project leader of the Maine Fishery Resource Office for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. “The open arch design has proven to be the best choice to restore ecological stream processes that will greatly benefit our headwater brook trout populations.”

Restoring free access to habitat is essential to protecting populations of wild brook trout. Maine has more than 80% of the remaining U.S. native stocks of brook trout, so local efforts are significant nationally. **[Read More - and See a Video](#)**
